HISTORY OF PAZHASSIRAJA COLLEGE

The migration of farmers from central Travancore to highlands of Malabar has a significant role in the modern History of Kerala. The migration caused a drastic change in the socio - cultural fields of Malabar. Among the various migration centres in Wayanad, Pulpally was a colony of migrant farmers. Though they established many schools here, their children haven't had any chances to earn higher education here. Some visionaries among the migrants took initiative for the establishment of a college under the leadership of T.U Jacob who later become the founder manager of Pazhassiraja College. Pazhassiraja Education Society was registered in the year 1980 and they could earn a provisional affiliation from the university of Calicut for two Pre-Degree courses as per U.O No. GAI/DI/7962/82 on 19 November 1982.

On November 29, 1982, the then-Kerala Education Minister, Sri. T. M. Jacob, officially inaugurated Pazhassiraja College. Dr. O. Suryanarayanan was the first principal and a year after he opted transfer to his native place, Prof. T. Mohana Babu was appointed as the principal. He led the college for the next 20 years.

The first permanent building was inaugurated in 15th of June 1987 by Sri M.P Veerendrakumar M.L.A. In the year 1991 the college was upgraded to an undergraduate college by starting B.A Economics Course. The Catholic Diocese of Bathery took over the college in July 1992. In September 1993 second degree course, B. A History was started and the University sanctioned the third Undergraduate course, B. A Tourism and Travel Management.

The college obtained 2f & 12B status from UGC in the year 1996. Two years later in 1998 Bachelor of Business Administration was started. The first undergraduate programme in science, B.Sc. Microbiology started in the year 2000. In the year 2001 Pre-Degree courses were de-linked as a part of general education policy of the state. M.Sc. Microbiology was started in the year 2002, which is the first Post Graduate course in Pazhassiraja College. In the same year, ladies hostel was inaugurated. In the



year 2002, the college also started B.Sc. Biochemistry. Master of Travel and Tourism Management and B.A Mass Communication courses were started in the year 2005. M.Sc. Biochemistry started in the year 2012. Master of Communication and Journalism and B.A. English Language and Literature courses were started in 2013. M.A Economics and M.Com courses were added in the year 2014.

The process of quality improvement initiatives were started in the year 2011 by establishing the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The NAAC peer team visit was held from 5th to 7th of February of 2015. Pazhassiraja College could secure a CGPA of 2.53 on four-point scale with B grade.

Pazhassiraja college started its first skill-based programmes B.Voc Agriculture and B.Voc Food Science in the year 2018. In the year 2021, college could start its first multi disciplinary programme, B.A Econometrics and Data Management. In 2022, Pazhassiraja College was reaccredited with A+ Grade by NAAC.

OUR MOTTO



'LIGHTED TO LIGHTEN'

The motto of the college along with its emblem has been assigned with a clear vision about the end of education. The main feature of the emblem is a 'sword and a shield' (The weapons of defence used by the tribal warriors of ancient Wayanad) which directly brings to our memory the great life of Pazhassiraja who fought against the British empire and sacrificed his life without surrendering before their might. Our college is named after this great patriot whose life came to an end at Pulpally where the college is situated. We believe that the end of education is liberation in all sense. The 'open book' and 'the light' signify the supreme power of knowledge which descends from the Almighty God. On the crown of the emblem is written the vedicmanthra 'Thamaso ma JyothirGamaya' which echoes the sincere wish of the visionaries to be raised into everlasting enlightenment by being lead from darkness to light and from ignorance to knowledge; thus to stand 'Lighted to Lighten'.

An Overview of Regulations for UG, PG and B.Voc Programmes University of Calicut

REGULATIONS FOR CHOICE BASED CREDIT AND SEMESTER SYSTEM FOR UNDER GRADUATE (UG) CURRICULUM -2019- (CBCSSUG 2019)

SIGNIFICANT POINTS EXTRACTED FROM THE REGULATIONS FOR CHOICE BASED CREDIT AND SEMESTER SYSTEM FOR UNDER GRADUATE (UG) CURRICULUM -2019

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

Students shall be admitted to UG programme under Faculty of Science, Humanities, Language & Literature, Commerce & Management, Fine Arts, Journalism and such other faculty constituted by University from time to time. The duration of a UG programme shall be 6 semesters distributed over a period of 3 academic years. The odd semesters (1,3,5) shall be from June to October and the even semesters (2,4,6) shall be from November to March. Courses: The UG programme shall include five types of courses, viz; Common Courses (Code A), Core courses (Code B), Complementary courses (Code C), Open Course (Code D) and Audit courses (Code E). Common Courses: In general, every UG student shall undergo 10 common courses (total 38 credits) chosen from a group of 14 common courses listed below, for completing the programme:

Credits: A student is required to acquire a minimum of 140 credits for the completion of the UG programme, of which 120 credits are to be acquired from class room study and shall only be counted for SGPA and CGPA. Out of the 120 credits, 38 (22 for common (English) courses + 16 for common languages other than English) credits shall be from common courses, 2 credits for project/corresponding paper and 3 credits for the open course. (In the case of LRP Programmes 14 credits for common courses (English), 8 credits for additional language courses and 16 credits for General courses). The maximum credits for a course shall not exceed 5. The credits of audited courses or extra credits are not counted for SGPA or CGPA. Attendance: A student shall be permitted to appear for the semester examination, only if he/she secures not less than 75% attendance in each semester. Attendance shall be maintained by the Department concerned.

Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10% in the case of single condonation and 20% in the case of double condonation in a semester shall be granted by University remitting the required fee. Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend the approved activities of the college/university with the prior concurrence of the Head of the institution. Participation in such activities may be treated as presence in lieu of their absence on production of participation/attendance certificate (within two weeks) in curricular/extracurricular activities (maximum 9 days in a semester). Students can avail of condonation of shortage of attendance in a maximum of four semesters during the entire programme (Either four single condonations or one double condonation and two single condonations during the entire programme). If a student fails to get the required attendance within condonable limit, he/she can move to the next semester only if he/she acquires 50% attendance. In that case, a provisional registration is needed. Such students can appear for supplementary examination for such semesters after the completion of the programme. Less than 50% attendance requires Readmission. Readmission is permitted only once during the entire programme.



EVALUATION AND GRADING

Mark system is followed instead of direct grading for each question. For each course in the semester letter grade and grade point are introduced in 10-point indirect grading.

Course Evaluation

The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts;

- 1) Internal assessment
- 2) External Evaluation

20% weight shall be given to the internal assessment. The remaining 80% weight shall be for the external evaluation.

Internal Assessment

20% of the total marks in each course are for internal examinations. Components with percentage of marks of Internal Evaluation of Theory Courses are-Test paper 40%, Assignment 20%, Seminar 20% and Class room participation based on attendance 20%. For practical courses - Record 60% and lab involvement 40% as far as internal is concerned. For the test paper marks, at least one test paper should be conducted. If more test papers are conducted, the mark of the best one should be taken. The Split up of marks for Test paper and Class Room Participation (CRP) for internal evaluation are as follows.

External Evaluation

External evaluation carries 80% of marks. All question papers shall be set by the University. The external question papers may be of uniform pattern with 80/60 marks. The courses with 2/3 credits will have an external examination of 2 hours duration with 60 marks and courses with 4/5 credits will have an external examination of 2.5 hours duration with 80 marks.

INDIRECT GRADING SYSTEM

Indirect grading System based on a 10-point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students. Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P, F, I or Ab) to that course by the method of indirect grading. An aggregate of P grade (35 % of marks) (after external and internal put together) is required in each course, where there is an external evaluation, for a pass and also for awarding a degree (A minimum of 20% marks in external evaluation is needed for a pass in a course). After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.

$$\text{SGPA} = \frac{\text{Sum of the credit points of all courses in a semester}}{\text{total credits in that semester}}$$

The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students. CGPA can be calculated by the following formula.

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{\text{Total credit points obtained in six semesters}}{\text{total credits acquired}(120)}$$

CALICUT UNIVERSITY FOUR-YEAR UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAMMES (CUFYUGP) REGULATIONS, 2024

PREFACE

The Four-year undergraduate programme curriculum is a structural and methodological departure from the existing curriculum. The existing three-year programme shall remain within the four-year programme with options of lateral entry and single exit. Outcome Based Education (OBE) practices are to be used to design the curriculum. The regulations of the four-year UG programme aim at synthesizing degrees, which is now an international standard adopted by all the universities across the world. While synthesizing degrees, there shall be no restriction on the subjects/ courses across the disciplines, as far as possible. Conscious efforts to develop cognitive and non-cognitive problem-solving skills among the learners shall be part of the curriculum. The programmes shall empower graduates as expert problem-solvers using their disciplinary knowledge and collaborating in multi-disciplinary teams.

1. FEATURES AND OBJECTIVES OF CUFYUGP

The features and objectives of the Calicut University Four-Year Under Graduate Programmes (CUFYUGP) shall be as follows:

- CUFYUGP shall have three Broad Pathways, (a)3-yearUGDegree, (b)4-yearUGDegree (Honours), and (c) 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research).
- Students who choose to exit after 3 years shall be awarded UG Degree in their respective Major Discipline after the successful completion of the required minimum of courses of total 133 credits.
- A four-year UG Degree Honours in Major Discipline shall be awarded to those who complete the CU-FYUGP with a specific number of courses of total 177 credits, including 12 credits from an optional graduate project/dissertation/internship training in their Major/ allied discipline, under the supervision of any faculty member of the college/ university/ higher education institution. In the case of BBA and BCA programmes, in the Honours stream, there is a 4-credit project in the third year and an 8-credit project in the fourth year in their Major/ allied discipline.
- Students who aspire to pursue research as a career may opt for Honours with Research stream in the fourth year. A four-year UG Degree Honours with Research in Major Discipline shall be awarded to those who complete the CUFYUGP with a specific number of courses of total 177 credits, including 12 credits from a mandatory graduate research project /dissertation in their Major/ allied discipline. In the case of BBA and BCA programmes, in the Honours with Research stream, there is a 4-credit project in the third year and a 20-credit project in the fourth year in their Major/ allied discipline.
- Students who secure 75% marks and above (CGPA 7.5 and above) cumulatively in the first six semesters are eligible to get selected to Honours with Research stream in the fourth year. A relaxation of 5% in marks (a relaxation of 0.5 grade in CGPA) is allowed for those belonging to SC/ST/OBC(non-creamy layer)/ Differently-Abled/ Economically Weaker Section(EWS)/other categories of candidates as per the decision of the UGC from time to time. If a greater number of eligible students are opting for Honours with Research programme than the number of available seats, then the allotment shall be



based on the existing rules of reservations and merits.

- **The proposed FYUGP curriculum shall comprise Three Broad Parts: a) Foundation Components, b) Discipline Specific Pathway components (Major/ Minor), and c) Discipline Specific Capstone Components.**
- The Foundation component of the FYUGP shall consist of a set of General Foundation Courses and a set of Discipline Specific Foundation Courses.
- General Foundation Courses shall be common for all students and shall be grouped into 4 major baskets as Ability Enhancement courses (AEC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), Value Added Courses (VAC), and Multi-Disciplinary Courses (MDC).
- Discipline Specific Foundation Courses are the Major and Minor courses in the first two semesters. They shall focus on foundational theories, concepts, perspectives, principles, methods, skills, and critical thinking essential for taking up advanced Courses.
- Ability Enhancement Courses shall be designed specifically to achieve competency in English and Additional Languages as per the student's choice with special emphasis on language and communication skills.
- The courses on Additional Languages shall be designed to enable the students to acquire and demonstrate the core linguistic skills, including critical reading and academic writing skills, expository as well as the cultural and intellectual heritage of the language chosen.
- Multi-disciplinary Courses (MDC) shall be so designed as to enable the students to broaden their intellectual experience by understanding the conceptual foundations of Science, Social sciences, Commerce, Language, Humanities, and Liberal Arts.
- Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) shall be designed to enhance workplace skills such as Creativity, Critical Thinking, Communication, and Collaboration—21st-century Skills.
- Value Added Courses (VAC) shall be so designed as to empower the students with personality development, perspective building, and self-awareness.
- Discipline Specific Pathway Components (Major/Minor) shall provide the students with an opportunity to pursue in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline and develop competency in that chosen area, which includes Major courses, Minor courses and discipline specific elective Courses.
- Major Components shall be the main focus of study. By selecting a Major, the student shall be provided with an opportunity to pursue an in-depth study of a particular discipline.
- The students in a Major discipline shall choose as their Minor stream a discipline other than their Major discipline. Students shall have the option to choose courses from disciplinary/interdisciplinary Minors and skill-based courses related to a chosen vocational education programme. In the case of BBA and BCA programmes, there are no Minor courses.
- Students shall be permitted to switch their Major at the end of the second semester by giving them sufficient time to explore different courses during the first year.
- The student has the option to register for and attend a course without taking part in the continuous assessment and end-semester examination of that course. Such a course is called the Audit Course. If the student has 75% attendance in an Audit Course, he/she is eligible for a pass in that course, without any credit (zero-credit).
- Social Activities shall include participation in National Service Scheme (NSS), sports and games, arts,



participation in university/college union related activities (for respective elected /nominated members), National Cadet Corps (NCC), adult education/literacy initiatives, mentoring school students, and engaging in similar social service organizations that deemed appropriate to the University.

- Options shall be made available for students to earn credit by completing quality-assured remote learning modes, including online programmes offered on the Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds (SWAYAM) or other online educational platforms approved by the Board of Study from time to time.

2. CREDIT STRUCTURE OF CUFYUGP

The proposed number of credits and the credit distribution for each course of the Undergraduate Programmes are given below:

- An academic year shall consist of 200 working days with two semesters and a summer vacation. In each semester there are 90 working days for academic activities and 10 additional working days for co-curricular and student orientation programmes.
- Students participating in activities of NCC / NSS /College Fitness Education Programme (COFE), students participating in zonal level events of arts and sports, and the elected members of the college union are eligible for 3 credits corresponding to SEC3 in semester VI. They are eligible for Pass (letter grade P) with grade point 4 and marks 33. Such students have the choice to improve their grade by taking part in the continuous assessment and the end-semester examination of this course. In that case, the higher grade point they subsequently acquire shall be considered as the final grade point, with corresponding letter grade, for SEC3. In the case of BBA and BCA programmes, the 3 credits for the said co-curricular activities are assigned to VAC3 in semester VI with the rest of the conditions as specified for the other programmes.
- Grace marks shall be awarded to a student for meritorious achievements in co-curricular activities (in Sports/Arts/NSS/NCC) carried out besides the regular hours. Such a benefit is applicable in the same academic year spreading over two semesters, in which the said meritorious achievements are earned. Grace marks shall also be awarded to a person with disability, and such other categories as may be decided by the University from time to time. The Academic Council shall decide from time to time the rules of awarding the grace marks.
- A student should get an option for acquiring a maximum of 180 credits for a 3-year (6 semester) UG programme. The additional 47 credits over the minimum of 133 can be acquired through online courses.
- A student should get an option for acquiring a maximum of 240 credits for a 4-year (8 semester) UG programme. The additional 63 credits over the minimum of 177 can be acquired through online courses.
- Courses up to 25 credits shall be designed for each programme in each semester with the available teaching hours for each semester. In the case of BBA and BCA programmes, courses up to 27 credits shall be designed in a semester with the available teaching hours for each semester.
- Maximum number of credits that a student can take per semester shall be 30.
- Candidates who wish to complete the undergraduate programmes faster may do so by completing different online courses equivalent to the required number of credits, and fulfilling all other require-



ments, in (N-1) semesters, where N is the number of semesters in an undergraduate programme.

3. ACADEMIC LEVELS OF DISCIPLINE - SPECIFIC PATHWAY COURSES

The pathway Courses shall be coded based on the learning outcomes, levels of difficulty and academic rigor. The coding structure is as follows:

It is mandatory for all students who enroll in CUFYUGP to acquire 39 credits from 13 general foundation courses, with 3 credits for each course.

5. College Transfer

There shall be provision for both inter-collegiate and inter-university transfer of the students. Depending upon the availability of seats, and academic and infrastructural facilities, the institution shall admit in each semester, by transfer method from other institutions, a certain number of students who are registered for particular programmes, subject to conditions as may be issued by the University.

Inter-collegiate transfer shall be permitted only in the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 7th semesters. Inter-university transfer shall be permitted only in the 3rd, 5th and 7th semesters.

College transfer shall be permitted only once in the entire programme. College transfer with switching in Major, Minor courses, and the academic pathway, is permitted only in the 3rd semester.



The transfer shall be within a period of two weeks from the date of commencement of the semester.

6. COURSE PARTICIPATION AND ATTENDANCE

A student shall be permitted to appear for the end-semester examination of a specific course to acquire the credits only if he/she has minimum 75% attendance (has completed minimum 75% of the prescribed classroom activities in physical, online, or blended modes, including any compensating activities as specified by the faculty of that particular course).

Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10% in the case of single condonation and 20% in the case of double condonation in a semester shall be granted by the University on the remittance of the required fee by the candidate.

Students can avail condonation of shortage of attendance in a maximum of four semesters during the entire programme (Either four single condonations or one double condonation and two single condonations during the entire programme).

If a student fails to get the required attendance within condonable limit, he/she can move to the next semester only if he/she acquires 50% attendance. In that case, a provisional registration is needed. Such a student can write the examination for the entire courses of the semester, in which shortage of attendance occurs, a supplementary examination only after the completion of the entire programme.

If the attendance is less than 50%, the student is eligible to continue the programme and has to seek readmission.

7. ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

- In the case of a 4-credit course with only theory component, the evaluation will be in 100 marks, out of which 30 marks will be by continuous/ internal evaluation and 70 marks will be by external evaluation.
- In the case of a 3-credit course with only theory component, the evaluation will be in 75 marks, out of which 25 marks will be by continuous/internal evaluation and 50 marks will be by external evaluation.
- In the case of a 4-credit course with only theory component and with five modules, out of the 30 marks by continuous/internal evaluation, 10 marks will be for the open-ended module and 20 marks will be for the other four modules. The 70 marks of the external evaluation will be based on the four modules other than the open-ended module.
- In the case of a 3-credit course with only theory component and with five modules, out of the 25 marks by continuous/internal evaluation, 5 marks will be for the open-ended module and 20 marks will be for the other four modules. The 50 marks of the external evaluation will be based on the four modules other than the open-ended module.
- In the case of a 4-credit course with 3 credits for theory component and 1 credit for practical/ practicum component, there can be four modules based on theory and one module on practical component. Out of the total evaluation of 100 marks, 20 marks will be for the practical / practicum component and it will be based on continuous/internal evaluation, and an end-semester examination and viva by internally appointed teachers of the Department Council. The 20 marks of the practical component will



be considered as part of the internal evaluation. Out of the remaining 80 marks for the theory component, 10 marks will be by continuous/internal evaluation and 70 marks will be by external evaluation.

- In the case of a 3-credit course with 2 credits for theory component and 1 credit for practical / practicum component, there can be four modules based on theory and one module on practical component. Out of the total evaluation of 75 marks, 15 marks will be for the practical / practicum component and it will be based on continuous/internal evaluation, and an end-semester examination and viva by internally appointed teachers of the Department Council. The 15 marks of the practical component will be considered as part of the internal evaluation. Out of the remaining 60 marks for the theory component, 10 marks will be by continuous/internal evaluation and 50 marks will be by external evaluation.

Practical/Practicum Examination

Continuous evaluation of practical by the teacher-in-charge shall carry a weightage of 50%. The end-semester practical examination and viva-voce, and the evaluation of practical records shall be conducted by the teacher in-charge and an internal examiner appointed by the Department Council.

8. LETTER GRADES AND GRADE POINTS

- Mark system is followed for evaluating each question.
- For each course in the semester letter grade and grade point are introduced in 10- point indirect grading system as per guidelines given below.
- The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) is computed from the grades as a measure of the student's performance in a given semester.
- The Cumulative GPA (CGPA) is based on the grades in all courses taken after joining the programme of study.
- Only the weighted grade point based on marks obtained shall be displayed on the grade card issued to the students.

SIGNIFICANT POINTS EXTRACTED FROM THE REGULATIONS FOR THE POST-GRADUATE CHOICE BASED CREDIT SEMESTER SYSTEM– 2019 (CBCSS-PG)

The PG Programme consists of Core courses, Elective courses and Audit Courses. The following are the common guidelines for coding various courses in order to get a uniform identification.

First three digits indicate the Programme/discipline code (ENG for English, MCM for M.Com, CHE for chemistry, PHY for physics, MLM for Malayalam, SKT for Sanskrit, HTY for History etc) Fourth digit is the Semester indicator which can be given as 1, 2, 3 & 4 respectively for I,II,III& IV Semester (MCM1, CHE2 Etc). Fifth digit will be the Course Category indicator as detailed below.

1. A student shall accumulate a minimum of 80 credits for the successful completion of the programmes.
2. Study Tour / Field visit / Industrial visit / Trip for specimen collection may be conducted as a part of the Programme as per the stipulations of the BoS concerned.
3. There will be two Audit Courses (Ability Enhancement Course & Professional Competency Course) with 4 credits each. These have to be done one each in the first two semesters.

4. There shall be a Project work with dissertation and Comprehensive Viva-voce as separate courses relating to the core area under study in the end Semester and included in the Core Courses.

5. All students have to submit a Project Report/Dissertation in the prescribed structure and format as a part of the Project Work undertaken as per the stipulations of the concerned BoS.

6. The students admitted in the PG programmes in affiliated colleges shall be required to attend at least 75 percent of the total number of classes (theory/practical) held during each semester. The students having less than prescribed percentage of attendance shall not be allowed to appear for the University examination.

7. Condonation of shortage of attendance for a maximum of 9 days (10% of the working days in a semester) in the case of single condonation and 18 days (20% of the working days in a semester) in the case of double condonation in a semester subject to a maximum of two times (for single condonation only) during the whole period of Post Graduate programme may be granted by the University as per the existing procedures. In the case of double condonation, only one condonation shall be allowed during the entire programme.



8. Evaluation pattern of attendance is as follows.

9. The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) Internal / Continuous Assessment (CA) and (b) External / End Semester Evaluation (ESE).

10. Of the total, 20% weightage shall be given to Internal evaluation / Continuous assessment and the remaining 80% to External/ESE and the ratio and weightage between Internal and External is 1:4.

11. Primary evaluation for Internal and External shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values (Grade Points) of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 & 0 respectively.

12. The criteria and percentage of weightage assigned to various components for internal evaluation are as follows:

Duration of Programme

The time period required for the conduct of B.Voc programme. It shall be six semesters distributed over a period of three academic years. Each semester shall have 90 working days inclusive of all examinations.

2) External Evaluation

- External evaluation carries 80% of marks.
- All question papers shall be set by the University.
- The external question papers may be of uniform pattern with 80/60 marks (The pattern is given in the Annexure II).
- The general components taken from other UG Programmes with 2/3 credits will have an external examination of 2 hours duration with 60 marks and courses with 4/5 credits will have an external examination of 2.5 hours duration with 80 marks.

B. Internship and Project

- Internship or the mini/main project should be carried out in the industry, not necessarily with industry partner. The major idea for internship is to implement the things learned and to get a real life experience.
- The Evaluation process follows 20% internal assessment & 80% external assessment.
- There will be internship/project at the end of 2nd and 4th semesters.
- The sixth semester includes one internship and project for the whole semester along with a term paper. Every student shall undergo one internship for the whole semester and along with that they should do a project based on their internship. At the end of the semester they should submit internship report and project.
- Every student will be assigned an internal guide, allotted from the parent department concerned or an expert available in the college appointed by the principal or the head of the department. The student has to make regular discussions with the guide while choosing the subject/area and throughout the life time of the project.

The following rules apply in matters of general discipline. These rules are supplemented with occasions from the Principal and the College Council from time to time which shall be either announced or shall be displayed on the notice board.

1.1 It shall be the duty of every student to abide by the rules and regulations of the college and conduct himself/herself with decorum in all places and under all circumstances. Ignorance of rules is not an excuse.

1.2 Students found destroying college properties are liable to be fined heavily and will be punished suitably.

1.3 No flag of student organizations shall be hoisted in the college campus

1.4 No celebration shall be held on the campus without the written permission of the Principal

1.5 All students shall abide by the decision of (1) the Principal and (2) the college council

1.6 It is mandatory for all students to wear their ID tag distributed from the college. Students without wearing ID tags will be fined and will not be allowed to enter the campus

1.7 Students are not permitted to loiter in the college campus during leisure hours. They shall either be in the library or leave the campus

1.8 Smoking, consumption of alcoholic beverages and use of narcotic drugs are strictly prohibited. Criminal proceedings will be initiated against those found guilty of the use of alcohol or narcotic drugs on the campus.

1.9 Outsiders are not permitted to meet any student in the college campus without the permission of the Principal.



1.10 Students are not permitted to indulge in any of the political activities in the college campus. Students are also prohibited from organizing or attending meeting other than the official ones.

1.11 Prior permission of the Principal, in writing, is necessary for:

1. Organizing processions, special meetings, entertainments or special functions in the college or college premises.
2. Collecting funds from the students or from the staff.
3. Putting up any notice on the notice board in the college or its premises.

1.12 Indecent behavior, especially towards opposite sex, will not be tolerated.

1.13 No students shall bring into college campus any banner, flag, board, notice, pamphlet or other such material for purpose of any political activity. If any student violates this, he/she will be summarily dismissed from the college.

1.14 Discourtesy towards any member of the staff or any act which affects the discipline of the college will be seriously viewed and in extreme cases it is sufficient reason for expulsion from college. Immorality, grave insubordination, contempt for authority, willful destruction of college property, malpractice in examinations etc are sufficient reasons for strict disciplinary action.

1.15 Notice signed or countersigned by the Principal and published on the notice boards should be considered as having been brought to the notice of the students of the college

1.16 Any student or group of students in the name of strike or agitation cannot disturb class or prevent the staff or Principal from carrying out their duties, stringent disciplinary action including dismissal will be taken against such students.

1.17 College campus, Examination room and Library are kept under CCTV surveillance.

1.18 Any question which are not covered by the foregoing rules shall be decided by the Principal



1.19 Students are to behave with decency and decorum outside the campus also. They should always remember that the good name of the institution is their responsibility.

ANTI-RAGGING POLICY

Our institution is committed to fostering a safe and respectful learning environment for all students. The Anti-Ragging Policy is a comprehensive framework designed to prevent and address any form of ragging, ensuring the well-being of every member of our academic community.

Ragging includes any form of physical, verbal, or psychological abuse, coercion, or harassment directed at any student, with the intent of causing distress or harm. This policy aims to create awareness and eliminate such behavior within the institution.

The policy explicitly prohibits activities such as bullying, teasing, intimidation, and any behavior that creates an uncomfortable or hostile environment for fellow students. Acts of ragging, whether within the campus or outside, will be dealt with sternly.

If any student is subjected to ragging on campus, immediate action will be taken by the authority. The victim or witness should report the incident to anti-ragging committee. The reported incident will be investigated and if the allegations are substantiated, the institution will take disciplinary action against the individuals responsible.
