





PAZHASSIRAJA - The Lion of Kerala

Kerala Varma Pazhassi Raja of Kottayam Royal Family in Malabar was one of the native rulers who fought against the British. He was the first South Indian who organized the people's voice against the very foundations of the British imperialism. He was born in 1753. He had a very strong army of thousands of the local 'Kurichiyas' and 'Nairs' who had rallied under his banner. His method of fighting resembled the 'guerilla warfare'. In the 1780s he extended his help to the British troops in their efforts to defeat Hyder Ali and later Tippu Sultan of Mysore who tried to conquer the Thalassery Fort of the British in Malabar. But when the Sultan withdrew from the battle, the British ignored Pazhassiraja. Consequently, Pazhassiraja objected the rules and policies of the British for collecting tax and he unfurled the banner of revolt against the East India Company. The Company took him to be 'the most intractable and unreasonable of all the Rajas of South India'. They resorted to all measures to bring about his subjugation which they could not. The continuous rebellions against the British rule between 1793 and 1797- were known as the First Pazhassi Revolt. The situation was very critical for the British and truce with Pazhassiraja became a matter of political expediency.

The jungles of Wayanad witnessed more fierce encounters from the Raja which forced the British garrisons to withdraw from Wayanad into the plain land. In 1800, the British once again moved to take possessions of Wayanad. Raising a large troop of Nairs, Kurichiyas and other local people, Pazhassi succeeded in organizing an efficient army to fight the British. Edachana Kunkan Nair and the Kurichiya leader Thalakkal Chandu had organized the native people in Wayanad for Pazhassiraja. The British Government decided to take up the challenge of Pazhassi seriously and crush the rebellion with an iron hand under the leadership of General Wellesley

and this achieved a great measure of success. Pazhassiraja became a wanderer in the jungles along with a few of his staunch supporters. The epic resistance of the Raja during 1800 to 1805 was known as the Second Pazhassi Revolt. In November, 1805 the British enforced a strict blockade of the Pazhassiraja in his jungle retreat. On 30th of November, 1805 the Raja was traced and shot dead at 'Mavilanthode', a place which lies very near to our College. Mr. Thomas Harvey Baber who was the sub-collector of Tellichery took the Raja's dead body in his own palanquin to Mananthavady and cremated it with 'customary honours'. In his words, Pazhassiraja, "although a rebel, was one of the natural chieftains of the country and might be considered on that account rather a fallen enemy; an extraordinary and singular character". His death as a martyr to the cause of freedom has invested his life with a unique halo and has won for the great prince an abiding place in the hearts of his fellow countrymen.

The college is named after this great martyr Pazhassiraja because of the historical relevance of the place where the College is located.

OUR MOTTO



'LIGHTED TO LIGHTEN'

The motto of the college along with its emblem has been assigned with a clear vision about the end of education. The main feature of the emblem is a 'sword and a shield' (The weapons of defence used by the tribal warriors of ancient Wayanad) which directly brings to our memory the great life of Pazhassiraja who fought against the British empire and sacrificed his life without surrendering before their might. Our college is named after this great patriot whose life came to an end at Pulpally where the college is situated. We believe that the end of education is liberation in all sense. The 'open book' and 'the light' signify the supreme power of knowledge which descends from the Almighty God. On the crown of the emblem is written the vedic manthra 'Thamaso ma Jyothir Gamaya" which echoes the sincere wish of the visionaries to be raised into everlasting enlightenment by being lead from darkness to light and from ignorance to knowledge; thus to stand 'Lighted to Lighten'.

CREDIT AND SEMESTER SYSTEM

With effect from the academic year 2009-10 all UG and PG Programmes (traditionally referred to as Course) are under Credit and Semester System. The duration of the UG Degree Programme shall be 6 semesters distributed in a period of 3 years and that of the PG Degree Programme shall be 4 semesters distributed in a period of 2 years. The odd semesters (1,3,5) shall be from June to October and the even semesters(2,4,6) shall be from November to March. Each semester shall have 90 working days including all examinations. A student has to complete a minimum number of courses (traditionally known as paper) in each semester. Certain value of credit is assigned for each course. Credit (Cr) of a course is a measure of the weekly unit of work assigned for a course. A student has to secure a minimum 120 credits for the successful completion of a UG Programme. The UG programme shall include 4 types of courses, viz., Common course (code A), Core course (code B), Complementary course (code C) and Open course (code D). Common courses are Language courses. A UG student has to undergo 10 common courses (18 credits). Core courses are offered by the parent department which ranges from 10 to 18 courses. Complementary courses cover one or two disciplines that are related to the core subject, but offered by other departments. Open course means a course which can be opted by a student at his or her choice from a department other than his/her parent department. The open course is scheduled in the 5th semester of each programme.

From 2019 onwards, a revised regulation for the UG Choice Based Credit Semester System (CBCSS) is being prepared for ensuring quality and learnercenteredness. It is called as the Regulations for Choice Based Credit and Semester System for Undergraduate (UG) Curriculum -2019.

1. PROGRAMME STRUCTURE (UG)

^{*}However the existing additional language pattern shall be continued. **The language pattern of BBA shall be the same as that of B.Com. in colleges where both the programmes exist.

Core courses: Core courses are the courses in the major (core) subject of the degree programme chosen by the student. Core courses are offered by the parent department.

Complementary courses: Complementary courses cover one or two disciplines that are related to the core subject and are distributed in the first four semesters. There shall be one complementary course in a semester for B.A Programmes. The complementary courses in first and fourth semester (Type 1) shall be the same. Similarly the complementary courses in second and third semester (Type 2) shall be the same. The college can choose any complementary course either in Type 1 or in Type 2 for a programme. Once they choose the complementary courses that should be intimated to the university. If a college wants to change the complementary course pattern (Type 1 or Type 2) prior sanction has to be obtained. All other programmes, existing pattern will follow.

Open courses: There shall be one open course in core subjects in the fifth semester. The open course shall be open to all the students in the institution except the students in the parent department. The students can opt that course from any other department in the institution. Each department can decide the open course from a pool of three courses offered by the University. Total credit alloted for open course is 3 and the hours alloted is 3. If there is only one programme in a college, they can choose either language courses or physical education as open course.

Ability Enhancement courses/Audit courses

These are courses which are mandatory for a programme but not counted for the calculation of SGPA or CGPA. There shall be one Audit course each in the first four semesters. These courses are not meant for class room study. The students can attain only pass (Grade P) for these courses. At the end of each semester there shall be examination conducted by the college from a pool of questions (Question Bank) set by the University. The students can also attain these credits through online courses like SWAYAM, MOOC etc (optional). The list of passed students must be sent to the University from the colleges at least before the fifth semester examination. The list of courses in each semester with credits are given below.

Project (2019 Regulations)

For 2019 admisssion, every student can either work on a project of 2 credits under the supervision of a faculty member or shall write a theory course based on Research Methodology as per the curriculum.

B. Attendance, Grace Mark, Extra Credits (2019 Regulation)

The minimum requirement of attendance during a semester shall be **75% for each course**. Attendance shall be maintained by the concerned course teacher. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 9 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of a Degree Programme may be granted by the University. A student is continuously absent for 14 days without sufficient reason and proper intimation to the principal of the college shall be removed from the roll.

A student shall be permitted to appear for the semester examination, only if he/ she secures not less than 75% attendance in each semester. Attendance shall be maintained by the Department concerned. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10% in the case of single condonation and 20% in the case of double condonation in a semester shall be granted by University remitting the required fee. Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend the approved activities of the college/university with the prior concurrence of the Head of the institution. Participation in such activities may be treated as presence in lieu of their absence on production of participation/attendance certificate (within two weeks) in curricular/extracurricular activities (maximum 9 days in a semester). Students can avail of condonation of shortage of attendance in a maximum of four semesters during the entire programme (Either four single condonations or one double condonation and two single condonations during the entire programme). If a student fails to get 65% attendance, he/she can move to the next semester only if he/she aquires 50% attendance. In that case, a provisional registration is needed. Such students can appear for supplementary examination for such semesters after the completion of the programme.Less than 50% attendance requires Readmission. Readmission is permitted only once during the entire programme.

Grace marks may be awarded to a student for meritorious achievements in cocurricular activities (in Sports/Arts/NSS/NCC/Student Entrepreneurship) carried out besides the regular hours. Such a benefit is applicable and limited to a maximum of 8 courses in an academic year spreading over two semesters. In addition, maximum of 6 marks per semester can be awarded to the students of UG Programmes, for participating in the College Fitness Education Programme (COFE).

Extra credits may be awarded to a student for achievements in co-curricular activities, viz., NCC, NSS, University level participation in sports and games, participation in inter-zone arts festival and participation in inter-University meets, carried out outside the regular class hours in a UG Programme. These credits shall not be counted while considering the minimum credits (120) for passing the Programme. For 2019 Admission onwards extra credits are mandatory for the programme. Extra credits will be awarded to students who participate in activities like NCC, NSS and Swatch Bharath. Those students who could not join in any of the above activities have to undergo Calicut University Social Service Programme (CUSSP). Extra credits are not counted for SGPA or CGPA.

C. Evaluation & Grading 2019 Regulation Indirect Grading System

Indirect grading System based on a 10-point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students.

Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P, F, I or Ab) to that course by the method of indirect grading. (Annexure I).

An aggregate of P grade (after external and internal put together) is required in each course for a pass and also for awarding a degree (A minimum of 20% marks in external evaluation is needed for a pass in a course. But no separate pass minimum is needed for internal evaluation). No separate grade/mark for internal and external will be displayed in the grade card; only an aggregate grade will be displayed. Also the aggregate mark of internal and external are not displayed in the grade card.

- 10.4. A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.
- 10.5. After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below. For the successful completion of a semester, a student should pass all courses. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of SGPA obtained.

SGPA of the student in that semester is calculated using the formula

Sum of the credit points of all courses in a semester SGPA = ---- Total credits in that semester

The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of the student is calculated at the end of a programme. The CGPA of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students. CGPA can be calculated by the following formula. Total credit points obtained in six semesters

SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to three decimal places. CGPA determines the broad academic level of the student in a programme and is the index for ranking students (in terms of grade points). An overall letter grade (cumulative grade) for the entire programme shall be awarded to a student depending on her/his CGPA (Annexure-I)

GRADE CARD

The University shall issue to the students grade/marks card (by online) on completion of each semester, which shall contain the following information:

- Name of University
- Name of College
- Title of UG Programme
- Semester concerned
- Name and Register Number of student
- Code number, Title and Credits of each Course opted in the semester
- Letter grade in each course in the semester
- The total credits, total credit points and SGPA in the Semester (corrected to three decimal places)

The final Grade card issued at the end of the final semester shall contain the details of all courses taken during the entire programme including those taken over and above the prescribed minimum credits for obtaining the degree. The final grade card shall show CGPA (corrected to three decimal places), percentage of marks (corrected to two decimel places) and the overall letter grade of a student for the entire programme. The final grade card shall also include the CGPA and percentage of marks of common courses, core courses, complementary courses and open courses

separately. This is to be done in a 10- point indirect scale. The final Grade card also contain the list of Audit courses passed and the details of Extra credits.

Evaluation of Audit courses: The examinaton shall be conducted by the college itself from the Question Bank prepared by the University. The Question paper shall be of 100 marks of 3 hour duration. For SDE/Private students it may be of MCQ/ fill in the blank type questions or Online question paper may be introduced.

CALICUT UNIVERSITY SOCIAL SERVICE PROGRAMME (CUSSP)

In this programme, a student has to complete 12 days of social service. This has to be completed in the first four semesters; 3 days in each semester. For the regular programme the student has to work in a Panchayath or Local body or in a hospital/poor home or old age home or in a Pain & paliative centre or any social work assigned by the College authorities. Students who engaged in College Union activities and participate in sports and cultural activities in Zonal level have to undergo only 6 days of CUSSP during the entire programme. The whole documents regarding the student should be kept in the college and the Principal should give a Certificate for the same. The list of students (successfully completed the programme) must be sent to the University before the commencement of the fifth semester examinations. A College level Coordinator and a Department level Co-ordinator shall be appointed for the smooth conduct of the programme.

AWARD OF DEGREE

The successful completion of all the courses (common, core, complementary and open courses) prescribed for the degree programme with 'P' grade shall be the minimum requirement for the award of degree.

Method of Indirect Grading

Evaluation (both internal and external) is carried out using Mark system. The Grade on the basis of total internal and external marks will be indicated for each course, for each semester and for the entire programme.

- Evaluation of the Project Report shall be done under Mark System.
- The evaluation of the project will be done at two stages :

- a) Internal Assessment (supervising teachers will assess the project and award internal Marks)
- b) External evaluation (external examiner appointed by the University)
- c) Grade for the project will be awarded to candidates, combining the internal and external marks.

- External Examiners will be appointed by the University from the list of VI Semester Board of Examiners in consultation with the Chairperson of the Board.
 The Chairman of the VI semester examination should form and coordinate the evaluation teams and their work.
- Internal Assessment should be completed 2 weeks before the last working day of VI Semester.
- 7. Internal Assessment marks should be published in the Department.
- 8. In the case of Courses with practical examination, project evaluation shall be done along with practical examinations.
- 9. The Chairman Board of Examinations, may at his discretion, on urgent requirements, make certain exception in the guidelines for the smooth conduct of the evaluation of project.

2. PASS CONDITIONS

• Submission of the Project Report and presence of the student for viva are compulsory for internal evaluation. No marks shall be awarded to a candidate if

- she/ he fails to submit the Project Report for external evaluation.
- The student should get a minimum P Grade in aggregate of External and Internal.
- There shall be no improvement chance for the Marks obtaind in the Project Report.
- * In the extent of student failing to obtain a minimum of Pass Grade, the project work may be re-done and a new Internal mark may be submitted by the Parent Department. External examination may be conducted along with the subsequent batch.

2. PROGRAMME STRUCTURE (PG)

A. 2019 Regulation, Course Pattern PG

Students shall be admitted to post graduate programme offered under any of the faculties of the University.

The programme shall include three types of courses : Core courses, Elective courses and Audit Courses.

Comprehensive Viva-voce and Project Work / Dissertation shall be treated as Core Courses. Project Work is mandatory for all regular programmes and Comprehensive Viva-voce is optional and these shall be done in the end semester. For SDE / Private Registration students both the Project Work and Comprehensive Viva-voce is optional instead they can have two additional theory courses as per the stipulations of the concerned BoS.

Total credit for the programme shall be 80 (eighty), this describes the weightage of the course concerned and the pattern of distribution is as detailed below:

- i) Total Credit for Core Courses shall not be less than 60 (sixty) and not more than 68 (sixty eight).
- ii) Total Credit for Elective Course shall not be less than 12 (twelve) and not more than 20 (Twenty).
- iii) Total Credits for Comprehensive Viva-voce and Project Work combined together shall be 8 (eight) subject to a minimum of 4 (four) credit for Project Work.
- iv) Total credit in each semester shall vary between 18 to 22.
- v) No course shall have less than 2 credits and more than 5 credits.

Elective courses shall be spread over either in the Third & Fourth Semesters combined or in any one of these Semesters (III / IV) only subject to the stipulations of the BoS concerned.

Study Tour / Field visit / Industrial visit / Trip for specimen collection may be conducted as a part of the Programme as per the stipulations of the BoS concerned.

Audit Courses: In addition to the above courses there will be two Audit Courses(Ability Enhancement Course & Professional Competency Course) with 4 credits each. These have to be done one each in the first two semesters. The credits will not be counted for evaluating the overall SGPA & CGPA. The colleges shall conduct examination for these courses and have to intimate /upload the results of the same to the University on the stipulated date during the III Semester. Students have to obtain only minimum pass requirements in the Audit Courses. The details of Audit courses are given below.

The required number of credits as specified in the syllabus/regulations must be acquired by the student to qualify for the degree. A student shall accumulate a minimum of 80 credits for the successful completion of the programmes.

ATTENDANCE

The students admitted in the PG programmes in affiliated colleges shall be required to attend at least 75 percent of the total number of classes (theory/practical) held during each semester. The students having less than prescribed percentage of attendance shall not be allowed to appear for the University examination.

Condonation of shortage of attendance for a maximum of 9 days (10% of the working days in a semester) in the case of single condonation and 18 days (20% of the working days in a semester) in the case of double condonation in a semester subject

to a maximum of two times (for single condonation only) during the whole period of Post Graduate programme may be granted by the University as per the existing procedures. In the case of double condonation, only one condonation shall be allowed during the entire programme.

Benefit of condonation of attendance will be granted to the students on health grounds, for participating in University Union activities, meeting of the University bodies /Govt. bodies and participation in other extracurricular activities on production of genuine supporting documents, with the recommendation of the Head of the Department concerned.

A student who is not eligible for such condonation shall be observed the provisions as per clause 11.4 of this regulation. The principal should intimate the details of these candidates at the commencement of the next semester.

Women students can avail maternity leave as per the existing university rules.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

Evaluation: The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) Internal / Continuous Assessment (CA) and (b) External / End Semester Evaluation (ESE).

Of the total, 20% weightage shall be given to Internal evaluation / Continuous assessment and the remaining 80% to External/ESE and the ratio and weightage between Internal and External is 1:4.

Primary evaluation for Internal and External shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values (Grade Points) of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 & 0 respectively.

Grade Point Average: Internal and External components are separately graded and the combined grade point with weightage 1 for Internal and 4 for external shall be applied to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA) of each course. Letter grade shall be assigned to each course based on the categorization based on Ten point Scale provided in clause 20.2 of this regulation.

Evaluation of Audit Courses: The examinaton and evaluation shall be conducted by the college itself either in the normal structure or MCQ model from the Question Bank and other guidelines provided by the University/BoS. The Question paper shall be for minimum 20 weightage and a minimum of 2 hour duration for the examination. The result has to be intimated / uploaded to the University during the Third Semester as per the notification of the University.

EVALUATION OF PROJECT WORK / DISSERTATION

There shall be External and Internal evaluation with the same criteria for Project Work done and the grading system shall be followed as per the specific guidelines and stipulations of the concerned BoS.

One component among the Project Work evaluation criteria shall be Viva-voce (Project Work related) and the respective weightage shall be 40%.

Consolidated Grade for Project Work is calculated by combining both the External and Internal in the Ratio of 4:1 (80% & 20%).

Details regarding the conduct of external and internal evaluation, criteria for evaluation and other aspects relating to the same can be taken by the concerned Boards of Studies and shall be specified in the Programme curriculum.

For a pass in Project Work, a student has to secure a minimum of P Grade in External and Internal examination combined. If the students could not secure minimum P Grade in the Project work, they will be treated as failed in that attempt and the students may be allowed to rework and resubmit the same in accordance with the University exam stipulations. There shall be no improvement chance for Project Work.

The External and Internal evaluation of the Project Work shall be done based on the following criteria and weightages as detailed below:

CONDUCT OF COMPREHENSIVE VIVA-VOCE

There shall be External and Internal Comprehensive Viva-voce; while the External Conduct of the Viva-voce is mandatory and the Internal conduct of the viva-voce will be optional subject to the decision and stipulation of the concerned BoS.

The concerned Boards of Studies shall design the structure, criteria, details of appointment of Board of examiners (both external and internal) and other relevant aspects of its evaluation.

There shall not be any Comprehensive viva-voce for SDE students.

For a pass in Comprehensive viva-voce, a student has to secure a minimum of D Grade in External and Internal examination combined. If the students could not

secure minimum D Grade in the Project work, they will be treated as failed in that attempt and the student may re appear for the same next time in accordance with the University exam stipulations. There shall be no improvement chance for Comprehensive viva-voce.

DIRECT GRADING SYSTEM

Direct Grading System based on a 10 – Point scale is used to evaluate the performance (External and Internal Examination of students)

For all courses (Theory & Practical)/Semester/Overall Programme, Letter grades and GPA/SGPA/CGPA are given on the following way:

No separate minimum is required for Internal evaluation for a pass, but a minimum P Grade is required for a pass in the external evaluation. However, a minimum P grade is required for pass in a course.

A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.

Improvement of Course- The candidates who wish to improve the grade / grade point of the external examination of a course/s they have passed already can do the same by appearing in the external examination of the concerned semester along with the immediate junior batch.

Betterment Programme One time- A candidate will be permitted to improve the CGPA of the Programme within a continuous period of four semesters immediately following the completion of the programme allowing only once for a particular semester. The CGPA for the betterment appearance will be computed based on the SGPA secured in the original or betterment appearance of each semester whichever is higher.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) - Calculation

The SGPA is the ratio of sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits of all the courses taken by a student.

After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.

Semester Grade Point Average - SGPA (Sj) = S(Cix Gi) / Cr (SGPA = Total Credit Points awarded in a semester / Total credits of the semester)

Where 'Sj' is the jth semester, 'Gi' is the grade point scored by the student in the ith course 'ci' is the credit of the ithcourse, 'Cr' is the total credits of the semester.

Model calculation is given in the Annexure:

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) - Calculation

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) = S(Ci x Si) / Cr(CGPA= Total Credit points awarded in all semesters/Total credits of the programme)

Where C1 is the credit of the lst semester S1 is the SGPA of the lst semester and Cr is the total number of credits in the programme. The CGPA is also calculated in the same manner taking into account all the courses undergone by a student over all the semesters of a programme. The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points.

For the successful completion of a semester, a student should pass all courses and score a minimum SGPA of 2.0. However, the students are permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of their SGPA.

3. PROGRAMME STRUCTURE (B.VOC)

The University Grants Commission (UGC) had launched a scheme for skills development based higher education as part of college/university education, leading to Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc.) degree with multiple entry and exit points. The B.Voc. programme is focused on universities and colleges providing undergraduate studies which would also incorporate specific job roles along with general education. This would enable the graduates completing B.Voc to make a meaningful participation in accelerating India's economy by gaining appropriate employment, becoming entrepreneurs and creating appropriate knowledge.

Evaluation & Grading (2019)

The evaluation scheme for each course (including projects) shall contain two parts; (a) Continuous Assessment (CA) and (b) End Semester Evaluation (ESE).

Of the total marks, CA shall be for 20% and ESE, for 80%.

The ratio of marks between internal and external is 1:4 except in the case of viva-voce.

Both internal and external evaluation shall be carried out using marks with corresponding grades and grade points in 7 point indirect grading system.

Grading System Seven Point Indirect Grading System

Evaluation (both internal and external) is carried out using Mark system. The grading on the basis of a total internal and external marks will be indicated for each course and for each semester and for the entire programme.

COURSE: A candidate securing at; east 'E' grade with 40% of aggregate marks and 40% separately for ESE for each course shall be declared to have passed in that course.

SEMESTER:

Those who secure not less than 40 % marks (both ESE and CA put together) for all the courses of a semester shall be declared to have successfully completed the semester.

The marks obtained by the candidates for CA in the first appearance shall be retained (irrespective of pass or fail)

The candidates who fail in theory unit shall reappear for theory unit only, and the marks secured by them in practical unit, if passed in practicals, shall be retained.

A candidate who fails to secure a minimum for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the same examination along with the next batch.

However a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of his/her SGPA.

A student will be permitted to secure a minimum pass marks required for the successful completion of a Semester or to improve his results at ESE of any semester, by reappearing for the ESE of any course of the semester concerned, along with the examinations conducted for the subsequent admissions.

PROJECT WORK

There shall be a project work with Dissertation to be undertaken by all students. The Dissertation entails field work, lab work, report, presentation and viva voce. The class hours allotted for project work may be clustered into a single slot so that students can do their work at a centre /location for a continuous period of time. However appropriate changes can be made by the concerned Board of studies in this regard.

Project work shall be carried out under the supervision of a teacher in the parent

department concerned or prescribed by the department coordinator.

A candidate may, however, in certain cases be permitted to work on the project in an industrial/ research organization on the recommendation of the Head of the Department/ Department Coordinator. In such cases, one of the teachers from the department concerned would be the supervisor/internal guide and an expert from the industry/ research organization concerned may act as co-supervisor/ external guide.

The project report shall be prepared according to the guidelines given in these regulations.

Two typed copies of the project report shall be submitted to the Head of the Department, two weeks before the commencement of the ESE of the final semester.

The external evaluation of the project work shall be carried out at the end of the programme. The credit of the project with marks awarded for the project work should be entered in the grade/mark sheet approved by the university.

Every student has to do the project work independently. No group projects shall be accepted.

The project should be unique with respect to title, project content and project layout. That is, project reports of any two or more students should not be identical, in any case.

In the case of SDE/Private Registration students, there is no project or viva voce. Instead of this, they shall have two extra courses to complete with their total credits equal to the total credits of the Project and Viva Voce.

Evaluation of Project work

The ESE of the project work shall be conducted by one external examiner and one internal examiner.

Evaluation of the Project Report shall be done under mark system.

The evaluation of the project will be done at two stages:

Continuous Assessment (CA) (supervising teacher/s will assess the project and award internal marks)

External evaluation (by external examiner appointed by the University)

Marks secured for the project will be awarded to candidates, combining the internal and external marks

The internal to external component is to be taken in the ratio 1:4.

External Examiners shall be appointed by the University from the list of IV semester (VI in the case of three year programme) Board of Examiners in consultation with the Chairperson of the Board.

Internal Assessment should be completed 2 weeks before the last working day of IV semester (VI Semester for three year programme).

Internal Assessment marks of the project should be published in the department at least two days before submitting the report for external evaluation.

Pass conditions for Project Work

Submission of the Project report and presence of the student for viva are compulsory for internal evaluation. For external evaluation (for programmes without practicals) the Project report submitted by the student shall be evaluated by the external examiner. No marks for the project shall be awarded to a candidate if she/he fails to submit the Project report to the College in time for external evaluation.

Student shall be declared to have passed in the Project course if she/he secures a minimum of 40 % marks in aggregate and 40% separately in external evaluation.

The student should get a minimum of 40 % marks for pass in the project. In an instance of inability of obtaining a minimum of 40% marks, the Project work may be redone and the report may be resubmitted within thirty days of intimation.

There shall be no improvement chance for the marks obtained in the Project

Report.

VIVA VOCE

The Viva voce shall be conducted by two examiners. For external viva, both of them shall be external examiners.

Appearance of CA and ESE are compulsory and no marks shall be awarded to a candidate if he/she is absent for CA/ESE or both.

PROGRAMME OBJECTIVES

The B. Voc courses are designed with the following objectives,

- a) To provide judicious mix of skills relating to a profession and appropriate content of General Education.
- b) To ensure that the students have adequate knowledge and skills, so that they are work ready at each exit point of the programme.
- c) To provide flexibility to the students by means of pre-defined entry and multiple exit points.
- d) To integrate NSQF within the undergraduate level of higher education in order to enhance employability of the graduates and meet industry requirements. Such graduates apart from meeting the needs of local and national industry are also expected to be equipped to become part of the global workforce.
- e) To provide vertical mobility to students coming out of 10+2 with vocational subjects

GENERAL PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

The B. Voc Programme is designed to bridge the potential skill gap identified. The curriculum in each of the years of the programme would be a suitable mix of general education and skill development components.

GENERAL EDUCATION COMPONENTS

- a The general education component provides emphasis to Communication skill, Presentation skill, Health and Safety, Industrial Psychology, Environmental awareness, Entrepreneurship development and other relevant subjects in the field.
- b An option for additional language should be provided which enhances the employability outside the state.
- c General Education Components should not exceed 40% of the curriculum
- d All B.Voc Programme should follow the General education component pattern listed below (Common English Courses and Additional language courses of LRP programmes of CUCBCSSUG 2014)

SKILL DEVELOPMENT COMPONENTS:

- a) This component should match the skill gap identified.
- b) At least 50% of Skill Development Component should be allotted to practical and can grow up to 60% based on the nature of the course. The practical component can be carried out in the college and/or the industry partner premises.

LEVELS OF AWARDS

B. Voc is a programme with multiple exits. Following table shows the various certificates and their duration

- 1. Students are free to exit at any point in the duration of the programme.
- 2. Only those students who successfully complete the courses and clear the examination are eligible for the certificate.

- 3. Separate certificate will be awarded for each year for successful candidates.
- 4. Students who fail in any course may be allowed to move the higher level but won't be eligible for any certificates until he/she clears previous courses.
- 5. B. Voc degree will confer to those whose successfully complete the diploma, higher diploma and internship.

ASSESSMENT OF STUDENTS

Assessment of students for each subject will be done by internal continuous assessment and Semester- End examinations. This dual mode assessment will be applicable to both Theory and Practical courses except for internship and project. Total marks in theory course reflect 80 marks external and 20 marks internal assessments. The mark division for practical courses are 20 marks internal and 80 marks external. For internship and project, there is no internal assessment. (Except for Broadcasting and Journalism, annexure attached).

INTERNAL

Internal assessment shall be conducted throughout the semester. It shall be based on internal examinations, assignments (such as homework, problem solving, group discussions, quiz, literature survey, seminar, team project, software exercises, etc.) as decided by the faculty handling the course, and regularity in the class. Assignments of every semester shall preferably be submitted in Assignment Book, which is a bound book similar to laboratory record. The mark distribution to award internal continuous assessment marks for theory subject should be as follows:

- 1. No candidate will be permitted to attend the end-semester practical examination unless he/she produces certified record of the laboratory.
- 2. Full credit for regularity in the class can be given only if the candidate has secured minimum 90% attendance in the subject. Attendance evaluation for each course is as follows

External

- Semester- End examinations for theory and practical courses will be conducted by the University. There shall be University examinations at the end of each semester for both theory and practical. Failed or improvement candidates will have to appear for the Semester- End examinations along with regular students.
- At the starting of each semester, Colleges should prepare question bank (containing maximum questions from each module of various types mentioned) for the external theory/practical examinations for all courses during that semester and will be sent to the university. University will prepare the question papers and answer keys for each course and will sent back to the college for conducting the examination.
- University will appoint a Chairman for each B.Voc Programme. Chairman will
 monitor the University Practical Examinations and Evaluation of Theory and
 Practical papers.
- For the evaluation of theory papers, Chairman should form a team consisting of a chief and required additional Examiners for each course.

- At the starting of each semester, Colleges should prepare a panel of External examiners for conducting Practical examinations. Chairman/University will appoint examiners from the panel proposed by colleges.
- Practical Examinations can be conducted and evaluated from the college or the industry partner premises. The team for conducting and evaluating practical exams should include an examiner appointed from the approved panel of faculties, and an internal examiner.
- Head of Institution/ Chief of Examination of the college should take necessary steps to prevent any malpractices in the Semester-End examinations. If any such instances are detected, they should be reported to the University without any delay.
- University will be issuing mark list, provisional/original certificates to the candidates.

INTERNSHIP AND PROJECT

Internship and the major project should be carried out in the industry, not necessarily with industry partner. The major idea for internship is to implement the things learned and to get a real life experience. The Evaluation process follows 100% external assessment.

- 1. There will be internship/project at the end of 2nd and 4th semesters and an internship for the whole sixth semester.
- 2. Every student will be assigned an internal guide, allotted from the parent department concerned or an expert available in the college appointed by the principal or the head of the department.
- 3. The student has to make regular discussions with the guide while choosing the subject/area and throughout the life time of the project.
- 4. At least three reviews should be conducted to evaluate the progress of work.
- An evaluation team is constituted for conducting the evaluation. The team consist
 of external examiner, allotted by the university from the approved examination
 panel, representative from the industry and a faculty.
- 6. Students should submit a report of their work. A valid certificate from the organization should be produced as a proof that the work is carried out in the respective organization.
- 7. Students are required to demonstrate the working model of their work (if possible) to the panel of examiners. A viva will be conducted based on the report and students are supposed to clarify the queries regarding their work.

MINIMUM FOR PASS

The successful completion of all the courses prescribed for the diploma/degree programme with E grade (40 %) shall be the minimum requirement for the award of diploma/degree.

ATTENDANCE

A candidate shall be permitted to appear for the Semester-End examinations only if he/she satisfies the following requirements:

- (a) He/she must secure not less than 75% attendance in the total number of working hours in each semester.
- (b) He/she must earn a progress certificate from the head of the institution stating that he/she has satisfactorily completed the course of study prescribed in the semester as required by these regulations.
- (c) His/her conduct must be satisfactory
 - It shall be open to the Vice Chancellor to grant condonation of shortage of attendance on the recommendation of the head of the institution in accordance with the following norms.
- The shortage shall not be more than 10%
- Shortage up to 20% shall be condoned once during the entire course provided such shortage is caused by continuous absence on genuine medical grounds.
- Shortage shall not be condoned more than twice during the entire course.
 Candidate who is not eligible for condonation of shortage of attendance shall repeat the semester as per university norms.

CREDIT SYSTEM

Each subject shall have a certain number of credits assigned to it depending upon the academic load and the nature and importance of the subject. The credit associated with each subject will be shown in the prescribed scheme and syllabi. Each course shall have an integer number of credits, which reflects its weightage.

a) One Credit would mean equivalent of 15 periods of 60 minutes each, for theory, workshops/IT and tutorials~

- b) For internship/field work, the credit weightage for equivalent hours shall be 50% of that for lectures/workshops~
- c) For self-learning, based on e-content or otherwise, the credit weightage for equivalent hours of study should be 50% or less of that for lectures/workshops.

INDIRECT GRADING SYSTEM

- Indirect Grading System based on a 7 -point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students.
- Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (A+, A, B, C, D, E or F) to that course by the method of indirect grading.
- An aggregate of E grade with 40 % of marks (after external and internal put together) is required in each course for a pass and also for awarding a degree/ diploma.
- Appearance for Internal Assessment and End Semester Evaluation are compulsory and no grade shall be awarded to a candidate if she/he is absent for Internal Assessment / End Semester Evaluation or both.
- For a pass in each course 40% marks or E grade is necessary.
- A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.
- After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.
 For the successful completion of a semester, a student should pass all courses.
 However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of SGPA obtained.
- SGPA of the student in that semester is calculated using the formula

SGPA = Sum of the credit points of all courses in a semester Total credits in that semester

 The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of the student is calculated at the end of a programme. The CGPA of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students. CGPA can be calculated by the following

CGPA = <u>Total credit points obtained in six semesters</u> Total credits acquired (180)

- SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to two decimal places. CGPA determines
 the broad academic level of the student in a programme and is the index for
 ranking students (in terms of grade points).
- An overall letter grade (Cumulative Grade) for the entire programme shall be awarded to a student depending on her/his CGPA

GENERAL DISCIPLINE

1. General Rules and Regulations:

The following rules apply in matters of general discipline. These rules are supplemented with occasional directions from the Principal and the College Council from time to time which shall be either announced or shall be displayed on the notice board.

- 1.1. It shall be the duty of every student to abide by the rules and regulations of the college and conduct himself/herself with decorum in all places and under all circumstances. Ignorance of rules is not an excuse.
- 1.2. Ragging is strictly banned on the college campus. Anyone found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging will be punished as per the directives of the UGC, Government and Supreme Court. All the incidents of ragging will be severely dealt with. The culprits will be dismissed from the college and police case will be filed against them.
- 1.3. College properties shall not be disfigured by affixing propaganda literature or by writing.
- 1.4. Students found destroying college properties are liable to be fined heavily and will be punished suitably.
- 1.5. No flag of student organizations shall be hoisted in the college campus.
- 1.6. No celebration shall be held on the campus without the written permission of the Principal.
- 1.7. All celebrations on the campus will be under the supervision of the Principal and the staff members deputed by him.
- 1.8. All students shall abide by the decisions of (1) the Principal (2) the consultative & discipline committee and (3) the college council.
- 1.9. It is mandatory for all students to wear their ID tag distributed from the college. Students without wearing ID tags will be fined and will not be allowed to enter the campus.
- 1.10. Students are not permitted to loiter in the college campus during leisure hours. They shall either be in the library or leave the campus.
- 1.11. Smoking, consumption of alcoholic beverages and use of narcotic drugs are strictly prohibited. Criminal proceedings will be initiated against those found guilty of the use of alcohol or narcotic drugs on the campus.

- 1.12. Any student residing in the college hostel found violating the college and hostel rules will be expelled from the hostel without notice.
- 1.13. Outsiders are not permitted to meet any student in the college campus without the permission of the Principal.
- 1.14. Students are not permitted to include in any of the political activities in the college campus. Students are also prohibited from organizing or attending meeting other than the official ones.
- 1.15. Prior permission of the Principal, in writing, is necessary for :
 - 1. Organizing processions, special meetings, entertainments or special functions in the college or college premises.
 - 2. Collecting funds from the students or from the staff.
 - 3. Putting up any notice on the notice board in the college or its premises.

1.16. Indecent behavior, especially towards opposite sex, will not be tolerated.

- 1.17. No student shall bring into the college campus any banner, flag, board, notice, pamphlet or other such material for purpose of any political activity. If any student violates this, he/she will be summarily dismissed from the college.
- 1.18. Discourtesy towards any member of the staff or any act which affects the discipline of the college will be seriously viewed and in extreme cases it is sufficient reason for expulsion from college. Immorality, grave insubordination, contempt for authority, willful destruction of college property, malpractice in examinations etc are sufficient reasons for strict disciplinary action.
- 1.19. Notice signed or countersigned by the Principal and published on the notice boards should be considered as having been brought to the notice of the students of the college.
- 1.20. Students are expected to maintain decency and decorum in their dress and conduct.
- 1.21. Students have to be inside the classrooms after the bell marking the beginning of class hours. Observance of strict silence in the standing posture is mandatory during the Morning Prayer.
- 1.22. Parents/guardians are expected to attend PTA meetings and to respond to the calls from the college authorities.

- 1.23. Teachers hold the responsibility of maintaining discipline in their classes and on the campus.
- 1.24. An office bearer will lose the office if he/ she is found guilty of indiscipline or misusing his/ her office.
- 1.25. Any student or group of students in the name of strike or agitation cannot disturb class or prevent the staff or Principal from carrying out their duties, stringent disciplinary action including dismissal will be taken against such students. If the college canteen incurs any loss due to the above mentioned activities of students, they will be held responsible for that and they are liable to compensate the loss.
- 1.26. The Principal in consultation with the college council may impose the following or other punishments to students who violate the general rules.
 - 1. Fines
 - 2. Cancellation of attendance
 - 3. Withholding of certificates
 - 4. Forfeit of educational concession and scholarship
 - 5. Suspension
 - 6. Expulsion/Dismissal
- 1.27. College campus, Examination room and the Library are kept under CCTV surveillance.
- 1.28. Any questions which are not covered by the foregoing rules shall be decided by the Principal.
- 1.29. Students are to behave with decency and decorum outside the campus also. They should always remember that the good name of the institution is their responsibility.

2. Ragging Prevention

Ragging is prohibited by law. It is a non-bailable criminal offence and punishable with rigorous imprisonment up to 7 years.

- 2.1. Students shall not indulge in any of the following activities which are treated as ragging.
- 2.1.1. Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other students.
- 2.1.2. Any act, that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activities of a student.

- 2.1.3. Exploiting the services of a junior student by a senior student or a group of senior students.
- 2.1.4. Indulging in rowdy or in-disciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.
- 2.1.5. Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- 2.1.6. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: annoying, playing practical jokes, sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts or gestures.
- 2.1.7. Any act of abuse by spoken words, e-mail, SMS, or any other means.
- 2.1.8. Any word or act that causes hurt to the dignity of the individual.
- 2.1.9. Entering without permission to any class other than the one assigned to the students.
- 2.1.10. Forcing a student to boycott class without his/her consent to participate in strike, demonstration, dharna etc.

2.2. Reporting cases for Ragging

The complaints or information in regard to ragging could be oral or written or even from third parties. The burden/ responsibility of proving his/her innocence rests with the accused. Complaints can be lodged with the Principal or College Council members or any member of the Ragging Prevention Committee. Any complaints/information received shall be kept strictly confidential.

2.3. Administrative Action in the case of Ragging

- 2.3.1. Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- 2.3.2. Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits.
- 2.3.3. Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process.
- 2.3.4. Withholding results.
- 2.3.5. Suspension/Expulsion from the hostel.
- 2.3.6. Cancellation of admission.
- 2.3.7. Rustication from the institution for period ranging from one to two years.

2.3.8. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specific period.

3. Sexual Harassment Prevention

Anti sexual harassment committee is functioning under women cell of the College to provide a healthy atmosphere to the students.

For this purpose, sexual harassment includes unwelcome sexually determined behavior (whether directly or by implication) such as:

- Verbal or Physical threats.
- Insulting, Abusive, Embarrassing or Patronizing behavior or Comments.
- · Offensive gestures, Language, Rumors, Gossip or Jokes.
- Humiliating, Intimidating, Demeaning and/or Persistent criticism, Open hostility.
- · Suggestive comments or Body language.
- · Isolation or Exclusion from normal work or study place.
- Publishing, Circulating or Displaying pornographic, Racist, Sexually suggestive or Otherwise offensive pictures or other materials.

The following is also sexual harassment and is covered by the committee:

- Eve-teasing
- Unsavory remarks
- · Jokes causing or likely to cause awkwardness or embarrassment
- Innuendos and taunts
- · Gender based insults or sexist remarks
- Unwelcome sexual overtone in any manner such as over telephone (obnoxious telephone calls) and the like
- · Touching or brushing against any part of the body and the like
- · Displaying pornographic or other offensive or derogatory pictures, cartoons, pamphlets or sayings
- · Forcible physical touch or molestation
- Physical confinement against one's will and any other act likely to violate one's privacy

Anyone found guilty of these will be punished as per the directives of the UGC, Government and Supreme Court. All the incidents of sexual harassment will be severely dealt with. The culprits will be dismissed from the college and police case will be filed against them.

4. Code of Conduct for Students

- 4.1. Any unavoidable movements on the verandahs during class hours have to be in silence. The students should always take care not to disturb the ongoing classes.
- 4.2. The students are expected to spend their free time in the library. They should not loiter on the corridor or gather on the college porch.
- 4.3. No student shall leave the campus during the working hours without the permission of the Head of the Department.
- 4.4. Students are forbidden to attend or organize any meetings in the college or collect money without the permission of the Principal.
- 4.5. Discipline and decorum are expected from the students during programmes conducted in the auditorium or elsewhere.
- 4.6. Prior permission from the Principal is essential to take part in competitions and games conducted in other places outside the campus.
- 4.7. Habitual negligence in college work, dishonesty, obscenity in word or action or other acts of misconduct will invite severe disciplinary action.
- 4.8. No pamphlets or notices should be distributed in classes without the permission of the Principal.
- 4.9. Any damage done to college property will have to be made good.
- 4.10. No students shall leave the classroom during a lecture without the permission of the teacher.
- 4.11. Smoking inside the campus is strictly forbidden.
- 4.12. Serious action will be taken against students bringing outsiders into the campus. Loitering of outsiders in the campus should immediately be reported to the Principal.
- 4.13. Complaints of the students must be presented through the proper channel. Students and staff can make use of the Grievance Redress mechanism available in the college.
- 4.14. It is the responsibility of the students and staff to follow the notices/ announcements concerning the rules and programmes of the college from time to time. Ignorance of these rules cannot be considered as an excuse for lapses.

4.15. The Principal is the ultimate authority in the interpretation and implementation of the rules and regulations in the best interests of the institution.

5. Working Days and Class Hours

College works under the full day system with two sessions; that is morning session of two consecutive hours divided into three periods and an afternoon session of two consecutive hours divided into two periods.

Morning Session : 9.30 AM to 12.30 PM Lunch Break : 12.30 PM to 1.30 PM Afternoon Session : 1.30 PM to 3.30 PM

At the beginning of the morning session, before the commencement of classes, there is a warning bell, and then the students should go into their respective classes and occupy their seats. Every day the classes begin with a two minute prayer.

6. Attendance

- 6.1. The teacher marks attendance at the beginning of each period.
- 6.2. All working days will be considered as full working days irrespective of the number of hours. Absence during one hour either in the forenoon or the afternoon session will be considered half a day of absence.
- 6.3. At the end of each month or at the beginning of the following month each student may check his/her attendance for each course from the concerned teacher.
- 6.4. The Attendance Percentage Certificate (APC) for each course is forwarded to the University at the end of each semester for promotion and for admission to the University examination.
- 6.5. Absence for 15 consecutive working days will result in the removal of the name from the rolls.
- 6.6. The minimum requirement of attendance during a semester shall be 75% for each course.
- 6.7. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of the Degree Programme may be granted by the University.
